



Story Behind the Stats

The Mississauga East-Cooksville riding is centrally located within the City of Mississauga. It consists of the part of the city east of a line drawn from north to south along the Queensway, Mavis Road, Highway 403, Central Parkway East and Burnhamthorpe Road East. It includes portions of City wards 1, 3, 4, and 7.

The riding is home to many recent immigrants, single parents, seniors, and young families with children. It has the highest rate of poverty in Peel Region – over 20% – and an alarmingly high rate of child poverty – over 30%. Access to affordable and quality housing is an issue, as is underemployment and unemployment of newcomers in the area.

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Taking Action in Mississauga East-Cooksville

Dixie Bloor Neighbourhood Centre (DBNC) was founded in 1988 by concerned members of the community to enhance the quality of life of those residing in the Dixie Bloor area. Staff, volunteers and neighbours work together to identify and discuss issues and concerns, develop and provide services and programs to meet the needs of the community, and promote community participation.

The Centre offers a wide variety of services with specialized programs for youth, seniors, newcomers, and low-income, expectant mothers. With several locations and no service fees, DBNC ensures that community members have access to their important programming.

DBNC's Job Search Workshop program assists newcomers with their employment goals through a needs assessment and referral process. Service users learn how Canadian companies recruit and hire, how to match their professional skills to their chosen Canadian occupations, how to develop a job search action plan, and how to determine the next steps to take in order to reach their occupational goals in Canada. The program helps newcomers expand their knowledge of the Canadian job market and workplace culture while boosting their confidence and self-esteem, thus targeting this population's underemployment and unemployment challenges.
