



Story Behind the Stats

The Mississauga-Streetsville riding lies within the northwest corner of the city of Mississauga and includes portions of city wards 6, 9, 10, and 11. The riding is ethnoracially diverse with nearly half of the population belonging to racialized communities. In particular, the riding is home to a large South Asian community.

Median individual income is just \$34,524. With limited incomes and lack of access to affordable housing, residents are using their food budgets to pay the rent – driving up the need for food banks and increasing the risk of homelessness.
