



### Story Behind the Stats

The Newmarket-Aurora riding is bordered by Bloomington Road, Bathurst Street, Wainscot Avenue/Haines Road, and Highway 404. It consists of the Towns of Newmarket and Aurora.

These towns consist of vastly different communities. The poverty rate for the riding does not accurately reflect either town. Aurora is a relatively affluent area while Newmarket is home to a mix of income groups, with many residents living at or below the poverty line. There is also a growing number of individuals who are working low-wage jobs and/or accessing social assistance. Food insecurity - and its related health consequences - is also ever-present in the area and there are a multitude of free emergency food and meal programs.

**121,925 people live in Newmarket-Aurora**

**10,932 live in poverty – 9.1%\***

# Taking Action in Newmarket-Aurora

York Region Food Network (YRFN) was located in Newmarket for 12 years and relocated to Aurora in 2012. YRFN takes a variety of approaches to combatting food insecurity created out of poverty in the region. From first response initiatives to prevention, education and advocacy, the Network has set out to address food insecurity in a number of ways.

## First Response or Emergency Food provision:

YRFN works with the food banks and meal programs in the region to support them in the work of meeting the emergency needs of people. It also manages the Food Reclamation Program, where food with broken packaging is made available by stores in the area to shelters, food banks and individuals who need it most.

## Prevention, Programming, Education:

The Network creates and maintains community gardens in both Newmarket and Aurora that give priority to those who do not have their own yards or access to land on which to garden. It also offers a Community Kitchen program and the Good Food Box Program and is in the process of establishing a Food Charter for York Region.

## Policy and Advocacy:

Through the Do the Math Working Group, YRFN has worked alongside other anti-poverty activists such as the Poverty Action for Change Coalition (local), and the Put Food in the Budget Coalition (provincial), to educate politicians and the public about the need to increase social assistance levels by \$100 a month as a place to start in addressing abject poverty.
